Hello all the members at St. Timothy.

We are experiencing changes all the time and yet we are not very good at handling the changes that come to us. Many times we are just passive recipients to the changes that are imposed on us. I wonder whether we can do better with the changes that always happen to us. I want to see whether we can make creative changes rather than passively receiving changes. I want to be an agent of making changes in my life rather than letting my circumstances control what is happening in my life.

Changes are scary because they always take us to where we have never been before. Entering into the unknown, the uncertain and the unfamiliar world makes us uncomfortable and uneasy. On the other hand, just because changes take us into the unknown, it makes our life much more exciting. Entering into the unknown is the nature of life. As we enter into tomorrow, we are entering into the unknown because we do not know what tomorrow holds for us. We have never lived tomorrow and so it is the brand new life we are going to live. In that sense, life is mystery because we always enter into the unknown everyday. But there is a saying, "So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today." (Matthew 6:34) Instead of worrying about tomorrow, we live today making changes so that we can be better prepared to enter into tomorrow.

As a congregation, God is calling us to take change seriously. We cannot go on in the same way just because we have done that way all this time. I hope that in the New Year, we can take the bold step in making radical changes. Of course, when we talk about changes, we are talking about fundamental changes not just cosmetic changes. God always invites us to make changes. Nicodemus, the rich, the powerful, the elite and the religious person came to Jesus, Jesus told him to be born again, to make the fundamental change. In Christ, we are a new creation. The old has gone and behold, the new has come. "Behold." I would like to see St. Timothy to behold the change that will happen in us this year. We can all work together to bring about changes in us, in our congregation and in our society. I am excited about the changes the Spirit will bring to us to give us new life. Together we can overcome our fear for the unknown. Together we can be creative agents of changes in our lives.







REFLECTIONSon2013

2013 was a year full of activity. I looked through the list of things to be thankful for that Rev. Chung compiled, and was amazed to see how much happened in our community, and also how fast time flies. I was asked to write about my reflections on this past year.











It is difficult to notice any themes or patterns emerging, but as I reflected, a few things came to my mind. One was a sense of increased ownership among lay people in our congregation. Our church has been blessed by the dedication and commitment of our staff, namely the ministers. Having this blessing, I think we became heavily dependent on them to provide the direction and leadership. This past year, however, saw the flourishing of more lay leadership. Starting with the election of our first ESM elders, they set the tone for greater ownership among those of us who are a part of this community. Their leadership led to a more active and visible BOM. I believe this lay ownership will continue onto the New Year.

I believe the increased lay leadership stems from greater spiritual maturity. And this maturity, in my opinion, has begun to develop through our study of the Scripture. Study of the Word became a more central part of the life of this congregation, and I could see the Spirit percolate in the hearts and minds of those who attended.

Another feature I saw in the church was a further manifestation of the second plank of our church's mission: that 1st and 2nd generation coexist in harmony. If I may, I would extend this plank and make it broader, to mean that different generations, not just 1st and 2nd, coexist in harmony. Ours is one of the few churches where there is harmony and interaction between different age groups, from college students to those in their 40's and 50's. Our annual congregational retreat makes this fact very visible and apparent.

Finally, I see a greater desire among many members to reach out more to the weak and vulnerable, which is the third part of our mission statement. From those who serve at Teesdale to Evangel Hall, and the openness to support organizations like the KCWA, I see movement to becoming more engaged with the society around us.



While no community is perfect, and we can all see flaws in it, I am thankful for this blessed community and look forward to seeing how God continues to move it.



When life is going so well, you really cannot, and certainly will not, relish or embrace possibilities for any change. Rev. Kim eloquently posits that we can be proactive in confronting the changes that present themselves to us, rather than be reactive, passive victims of them. But how difficult this can be! Change for the worse can be destructive and devastating. And the cruellest part of it is that it can be unexpected, and quick, and can strike in the myriad faucets of our complex and compelling lives: health, finance, relationship, career, etc. From the vantage point of an individual who has everything going for them, this kind of thinking can quickly transform their optimism – and general naivety – into a deep sense of burdensome pessimism.


