About 7 years ago, when my kids started Korean class at the church, I noticed that the Korean class was not very different from other classes my kids attended. At that time, there were only two classes for advanced/older students and beginner/younger children. Ms. Helen Lee taught the little kids with fun games and contemporary Korean songs. Learning Korean together with familiar church friends made my kids feel more welcome and all the fun things they were doing in the class enticed them even more to participate. It was definitely a good experience for my kids and I felt thankful for the opportunity they had. It was especially beautiful to see how Helen was serving the kids with passion and love and it led me to the decision to volunteer to help Helen. 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Since then, St. Timothy Korean School has steadily grown every year and now we have about 40 children from KSM and ESM attending Kindergarten, Junior Beginner, Senior Beginner, and Advanced classes. The number of children has more than doubled in the last 10 years thanks to all the quiet but dedicated serving hands filling all the areas of needs. They might not be fully recognized yet but I believe that it was all these people working behind the scenes that have brought the program to where it is today. They have made all the difference.

Personally, if I am not very close with someone, I am not good at approaching and asking people to help. This was the most difficult part for me: asking people to join. However, I realized that there were always some people who already sensed the need. When they became new partners, every individual brought their own unique way of serving. It could be innovative ideas like planning new events to attract more participation from the parents and students, or running class in a very different way. Because we are so different, the work became more enjoyable and interesting.

Our goal for St. Timothy Korean School is to help our children become more engaged in Korean culture and heritage. We hope that kids will become more motivated to learn about our cultural heritage and will enjoy learning Korean together as a community. Through these experiences, we pray that it will bring our community, including KSM and ESM closer together.
