I believe in a long-term relationship. We will never know a person unless we have gone through the seasons of spring, summer, fall and winter with that person. It takes time to build up a relationship and once we have built such a relationship and friendship, living with care and in harmony, we are one step closer to God's kingdom.

Our church is committed to continuing our relationship with various organizations in 2014. It has been more than ten years since we have provided hot meals for about 120 people every third Thursday at Evangel Hall. It has been more than six years since we have run the food bank program at Teesdale every Thursday. And it has been more than four years that we have led the Sunday worship service at Teesdale. Don't get me wrong. We are not the only ones who always give and provide. In many cases, we have been on the receiving end. I can speak from my experience as a pastor of the Teesdale Church for the past two plus years. I have received so much love and respect from the members of the church and I have learned the sheer joy of sharing whatever we have with one another whether it is a cup of coffee or a birthday card.

This spring, our church is taking over a food bank program at PARC (Parkdale Activity-Recreation Centre, 1499 Queen St. W.) from the Red Cross. They have been involved for the last three years but at this point they would like to concentrate on another initiative for the Parkdale community. We will officially take over from April but in order to ensure a smooth transition, we will start a training program for the volunteers in February and serve with the Red Cross for the month of March. The food bank at PARC is well organized and established since there are a lot of local volunteers. Therefore, we don' t need much help in the areas of general labour, but we do need interviewers who can interview the clients and provide the guideline for their food intake, which is the most important task as an agency. The food bank program runs every Tuesday and we need volunteers for interviewing the clients from 10am to noon and 2pm to 4pm. You do not have to commit to serve every Tuesday, but if you can come even once a month, that is more than enough.

I believe in a long-term relationship. And I believe it is one of the essential teachings from Jesus who valued every soul and cherished any relationship. My friends, this year's theme is "change." And I hope you can try a new thing you have never done before with faith in God with whom everything is possible. Any volunteers? If you have questions, please talk to either Helen Lee or me. 


